Author's Guide for Submission of Manuscripts

Asian Agri-History, an international quarterly journal, is being published in English by the Asian Agri-History Foundation to promote understanding of all historical aspects of the development of agriculture in Asia from the earliest known records until the early 20th century. Contributions may be research-based, observational, or theoretical, and may concern terrestrial or aquatic; and managed or natural agroecosystems. Asian Agri-**History** will also consider contributions based on original research, both full-length papers and short communications, but will adopt a flexible policy regarding other kinds of submissions, such as translations of old documents, mini-reviews, scholarly views, and commentaries. All authors must be subscribers to Asian Agri-History journal.

Asian Agri-History journal has a broadbased outlook. It will include the history of the following subjects:

- Agricultural economics and sociology
- Agricultural education
- Agricultural engineering and farm implements
- Agroastronomy and farmers' beliefs
- Agroclimatology
- Agroforestry
- Agrogeography
- Animal husbandry: livestock, poultry, fishery, aquaculture, apiculture, and sericulture
- Crop diversity and cropping systems
- Farm management and farming systems

- Organic and conservation agriculture
- Origin and spread of crops
- Plant protection
- Postharvest management of produce
- Seed quality and storage
- Soil health and fertility
- Sustainable agriculture practices
- Useful plants
- Water harvesting and irrigation
- Women in agriculture
- Others: agricultural libraries; botanical gardens; biographies of leaders in agriculture; interviews with veteran farmers (75 years and above); traditional agricultural products and uses

Format

All manuscripts should be in 1.5 line spacing on A4 size paper, with margins of at least 3 cm all around. The title page should contain: 1. Title (maximum 100 characters); 2. Name(s) of author(s); 3. Full postal address(es); 4. Name and address (also telephone number and email ID) of the corresponding author; 5. Category of article (Full-length paper, Short communication, Translation of old document, Minireview, Scholarly view, or Commentary); 6. Subject heading.

Full-length papers and **Short communications** reporting original research should be structured in the following order: title page (as given earlier), abstract for **Full-length papers** (not more than 250 words), introduction, body, discussion, acknowledgments, references, tables, figure legends, and figures. Tables and figures should be on separate pages, in upright position and not 'landscape'. **Full-length papers** should not exceed 20 typed pages.

The above format may be varied for Translations of old documents, Mini-reviews, Scholarly views, and Commentaries. All articles, however, must contain the title page. Articles treating a defined specialist subject of historical importance will be considered as Mini-reviews and should not exceed 20 typed pages. Scholarly views are speculative and provocative opinions. Commentaries are comments on any of the publications of the Asian Agri-History Foundation, supplementing or questioning the published contents. All articles, except Short communications, Scholarly views, and Commentaries, should be preceded by an informative abstract, which should not exceed 250 words.

Reflections of leaders are invited articles intended to document the events of the life of leaders in agriculture, for the benefit of generations to follow. **Biographies** of leaders in agriculture are also accepted.

Viewpoint will include views on a specific subject related to the history of Asian agriculture. Communications should not exceed two pages.

Articles or extracts from old, rare documents in English can also be submitted along with permission (if required) for reproduction. Such articles will be published as **Selected articles**, **Selected notes**, or **Agri-history kaleidoscope.** New books on ancient agriculture will be considered for review, which will be published as **Book review.**

Letters to the editor will include views on topics related to Asian Agri-History. Communications should not exceed one page.

Figures

All articles must include one or more figures. Computer generated illustrations should be scanned at high resolution and submitted preferably as .tif or .jpeg files on CD or through email.

References

All references should be cited in the text by last name of the author(s) with the year of publication [e.g., Mishra (1998); or (Mondal and Pal, 1999)]. When there are more than two authors, use the first author followed by *et al.* [e.g., Shahare *et al.* (2002) or (Shahare *et al.*, 2002)]. The references should be listed in alphabetical order at the end of the article. Journal titles must be in full, not abbreviated. The following examples provide more detailed guidance.
